Through Weebly, students track class assignments and content and teachers design curriculum in a way that allows students to easily connect. Teachers at Lee High School have begun to implement project-based learning as a way of assessing student knowledge and understanding. Technology is integrated across all content areas for all grade levels.

At Robert E. Lee High School, iPad has allowed teachers to facilitate the design of an engaging curriculum. Students create stop motion videos, collect research data, and collaborate on projects. Using apps such as Weebly, Edmodo, and GarageBand, teachers reach students in new ways. For example, GarageBand is used in Abdulkader Mokhtari's technical writing class during the poetry unit. Students listen to music and read song lyrics, then write and record their own song for a formative grade.

maroon and white, and the saying, "Once a Gander, Always a Gander," have continued through the years, and April 27, 2013, a historical marker, sponsored by the Baytown Historical Preservation Association, was placed in front of the school. Located near the banks of Goose Creek in Baytown, Lee serves more than 1500 students. Goose Creek CISD and Lee High School received "Met Standard" ratings, the highest ratings possible from the Texas Education Agency for 2015, and Distinction Designations for Math, Science and Closing Performance Gaps.

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
