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TAME Trailblazer

More than 1,600 Goose Creek CISD 6th-grade students spent science class inside a mobile interactive exhibit this month learning about space, energy, weather and aerodynamics as part of a workforce development initiative sponsored by Chevron Phillips Chemical Company.

The mobile education unit called the Trailblazer trailer by the Texas Alliance for Minorities in Engineering (TAME), allowed students to take a field trip in the parking lots of their schools.

The Trailblazer spent two days at every junior school in the Baytown area from Nov. 3-14. The Trailblazer was recently exhibited at Sterling Municipal Library, but this is the first time the Trailblazer has visited any Baytown schools.
