

Dedication of Star Sensory Motor Lab at Carver Elementary

Thanks to the thoughtfulness of some Carver Elementary teachers and the generosity of the Goose Creek CISD Education Foundation, Carver special needs students have a new lab, and the name of Heaven Moore, former Carver PPCD student who passed away in May 2013 at the age of four, will live on forever at Carver.

The Star Sensory Motor Lab at Carver Elementary was dedicated to the memory of Heaven Moore in a ceremony December 11. The 4th and 5th grade choirs, under the direction of Vicki Westbrook, sang "Breath of Heaven" to open the ceremony.

Raul Moreno, area executive director and interim principal at Carver, welcomed guests. Dr. Tom Kelchner, director of special education, and Randal O'Brien, GCCISD acting superintendent, told the audience about the grants that were received from the GCCISD Education Foundation as well as Heaven Does, Inc., the foundation created by Heaven's parents, John and Gia Moore. They thanked Lisa McBride, SILC teacher, and Jennifer Owens, PPCD teacher, for their dedication to their students and for taking the initiative to apply to the Education Foundation for an innovative teaching grant.

McBride gave an overview of the lab, explaining that it was to help PPCD and SILC students develop skills to be ready to learn and master academic appropriate behavior.

"It is our hope that this lab will help our students develop the skills to increase their ability to attend in the classroom and accomplish tasks," said McBride. "Just in the short time we have been attending the lab, we have already seen an increase in time our students remain seated during group instruction. We are very grateful to the Goose Creek Education Foundation, the Heaven Does Foundation and Dr. Kelchner for making the Star Sensory Motor Lab a possibility."

Owens presented the plaque for the lab, which will ensure that Heaven's name will live on forever at Carver. Heaven had the opportunity to use several items now in the lab while she was at Carver.

"I know if Heaven were here with us, she would enjoy every piece of the lab," said Owens.

Heaven's sister Mary, 6th grade student at Horace Mann Junior School and former Carver student, held a cluster of pink balloons, Heaven's favorite color, that had been presented to the family.
