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Six Students from GCCISD Represent Texas at National History Day Competition

"Over 55,000 students across Texas competed at the local level in 2013 to earn the opportunity to represent Texas in this contest, which sees over 2,800 hundred students from 50 states, two territories, the District of Columbia, and several other affiliates in foreign countries compete to see who has the best history research and presentation skills.
