Through the Partners In Education program, sponsored by the Baytown Chamber of Commerce, businesses are paired with Goose Creek CISD schools depending on resources and needs. Sponsoring organizations plan a number of activities for the students of their schools each month, ranging from tutoring and mentoring programs, to perfect-attendance incentives, to academic incentives, and lunchbuddy programs, to field trips and guest speakers. The Baytown Chamber's Partners In Education program started in 1987 with three partnerships, and has grown to 29 partnerships

Exxon BTEC has partnered with a Goose Creek CISD school for 22 years. This is the second time ExxonMobil BTEC has been recognized as partner of the year. The first time was in 2002 with San Jacinto Elementary School.

"ExxonMobil BTEC continues to be an outstanding partner year after year," said chamber president and CEO Tracey Wheeler. "Almost every year, they are in the running for Partner of the Year

In an effort to reach all students with the information about college and career planning, diversity groups from the partner's company planned programs. Approximately 12 members of BEST (Black Employee Success Team) set up displays of inventions by African Americans and interacted with students in the Commons during lunch for Black History Month, providing information about educational opportunities and careers, as well as serving as positive role models for the students

Students received a boost with making college and career decisions when a STEM (Science, Technology, Engineering and Math) conference was sponsored by GOAL (Global Organization for the Advancement of Latinos) network on the school campus. ExxonMobil BTEC employees gave students information about careers involving science, technology, engineering and math, along with scholarship information. Students from all three high schools, along with many parents, attended the event held on a Saturday in February

Another diversity group from ExxonMobil BTEC, WIN (Women's Interest Network) conducted a panel discussion in March with approximately 30 young ladies from Lee who were interested in pursuing careers involving math and science. Focusing on overcoming obstacles to be successful, the WIN group provided an interactive session and a delicious lunch.
