People who know the Goose Creek school district and Lee College today probably find it hard to believe that one person ever headed both. But George Gentry did it for nearly 20 years.

Gentry Junior School is named in honor of the former school superintendent and Lee College President.

When Gentry came to Baytown in 1946 to be superintendent his new job went hand-in-hand with the Lee College presidency. School trustees had formed the college in 1934, but the college didn't get its own board of regents until 1965. Gentry handed over the presidency in 1965.

The school district's enrollment more than doubled and its budget skyrocketed during Gentry's 24 year tenure. Lee High School got Memorial stadium, a new cafeteria and a vocational building. George Washington Carver also moved into a new building. Gentry's name was included among the 240,000 entries in "Who's Who in America" in 1962.

Gentry also saw the district through racial integration in the mid-60. And he helped the district merge with nearby Cedar Bayou school district in March 1954.

When Gentry retired in 1970, hundreds of district patrons and educators from across the state attended a dinner in his honor. The Texas Education Agency commended him for improving salaries and working conditions and for his efforts in the juniorcollege movement.

Gentry didn't slow down in retirement. He regularly drove cancer patients to Houston for treatments. He also served on Baytown's senior citizens committee that organized a taxi program for the elderly.

He served as president of the Baytown Retired Teachers Association and in 1975 received special recognition by the National Retired Teachers Association. Gentry was born in Oak Cliff and graduated from high school in Waco. He attended Baylor University and received his master's degree from the University of Texas. He also studied at the graduate level at Columbia University in New York.

Gentry worked in education for 20 years before coming to Baytown. He began as a principal of all three Big Spring schools in 1926. In 1938, he took over as an assistant superintendent there. In 1941, he moved to Temple where he was assistant superintendent of schools and president of the junior college.

Gentry, known as "Mr. G" may be best remembered for standing guard behind the goal post during every Gander football game. He caught the ball that sailed through the goal posts for an extra point after each touchdown. Gentry once explained that he started the tradition in Big Spring, where the football field stood in the middle of an open prairie. Teams kept losing footballs until Gentry decided to stand back there and
