Instead of focusing on the hardships that result from a migrant lifestyle, she appreciates the opportunities that come her way. With her teachers' support, Rojas will become the first one in her family to attend college this fall. 'I want to do something with my life," she says, "I want my whole family to be proud of me." Rojas plans to obtain a bachelor's degree in criminal justice and one day work for the Federal Bureau of

Sigala migrates with her parents, Antonio and Maria Sigala, her two brothers and sister twice a year to Lubbock, Texas, to work sorting peppers. Sigala believes one of the advantages of migrating is the one-on-one attention she received from her migrant educators. She passed a UT Migrant Student Program credit by exam with a 90. "UT courses gave me a second chance that I thought I was not going to have," says Sigala Graduating from high school is an accomplishment that Sigala earned through dedication and many sacrifices. Like Rojas, Sigala also plans to obtain a bachelor's degree in criminal justice. She aspires to become a correctional officer.

"I think that it is great that our migrant students get recognized for the things that they do," says Coordinator of Migrant Enid Lindsey, "When you look at their lifestyles and their situations migrating from one place to another you think, wow, they really deserve the best.

Dr. Toby York, Goose Creek CISD Superintendent of Schools, echoes Lindsey's sentiments. "I am so proud of Alejandra and Jessica. They are very deserving of this recognition and serve as an example to other migrant students that they, too, can overcome obstacles and be successful.
