s we all gear up for the 2019-2020 school year, we thought it would be helpful to provide you with some important information about our district, including an instructional

a phone/email list, some new faces you'll see around the district and highlights about some of our students, teachers and programs. Most of this information can be found on our website at www.gccisd.net, but this publication will allow you to have it at your fingertips.

Our district's theme this year is "Here, We Grow Giants." We are continuing our partnership with the City of Baytown with this campaign, which will highlight many students, teachers, administrators and programs at our campuses and facilities as well as our alumni.

It's going to be a busy year in Goose Creek CISD! We are grateful that the community approved the \$335.7 million bond proposal in May, and we have been working on a Citizens Bond Oversight Committee to assist us as we begin these projects, which include a new elementary school, a replacement school for San Jacinto Elementary and a new junior school to alleviate overcrowding. Repairs, a new fieldhouse for Stallworth Stadium, technology upgrades as well as safety and security improvements also are included in the 2019 Bond.

Speaking of safety and security, we know that communication between parents and the schools or district is important to the safety and well-being of our students, so we are adding the Text Message Option to our SchoolMessenger callout system. You should have already received information about SMS/text messages from the district or from your child's school. You still will be able to receive calls and/or emails, so please make sure your contact information is correct.

We are piloting a Dual Language Two-Way Program in kindergarten at Harlem Elementary and Carver Elementary this year. Eighty-eight students were accepted into the program, with two classes of 22 at each campus. This program is an enriched educational model that integrates native English speakers and native Spanish speakers in the same classroom to promote second language acquisition, high academic achievement and cross-cultural understanding. We are pleased to be able to offer this opportunity to our students in GCCISD and are looking forward to seeing their progress.

I am proud to be the superintendent of a district that receives strong support from our community and business partners to benefit our students, our staff and our schools. I'm excited about the opportunities the 2019-2020 school year has in store for us as we work together to reach new heights.



District Elementary Teacher of the Year

Anna West is the 2019 Elementary Teacher of the Year for Goose Creek CISD.



West began her teaching career as a firstgrade teacher at Bonnie P. Hopper Primary School in 2005, transferring to Victoria Walker Elementary after two years. In 2010, she became a stay-at-home mom, and although she enjoyed those four years, she kept imagining herself back in the classroom. She has been teaching kindergarten at VWE for the past five years.

After attending Relay for Life with a foreign exchange student her family hosted in 2017, West realized the importance of the community coming together to fund cancer

research and end cancer. School-Based Clinic Serves Area Children

The Goose Creek CISD School-Based Clinic at San Jacinto Elementary opened its doors in 2010. The 3,000 square-foot clinic has six exam rooms. Pediatric providers care for newborns to teenagers up to 18 years old.

The clinic is open to all students in Baytown and beyond.

The Goose Creek School-Based Clinic, located at 2615 Virginia Street, is linked with a Harris County Hospital District Health Center and staffed with an advanced practice nurse, a licensed vocational nurse and a clinical clerical specialist.

The school district absorbs the cost of clinic

space, electricity and telephone lines, and in return the School-Based Clinic provides a wealth of services to children who otherwise would not have convenient access to healthcare. These services include well child exams, family education, evaluation and treatment of minor acute and chronic health problems, referrals, pharmacy services, basic lab procedures, vision/hearing screening and immunizations.

The clinic is open Monday through Friday from 7:30 a.m. – 4 p.m. and is closed from noon to 1 p.m. To make an appointment, call 713-873-5437.

All Campus Visitors

To ensure the safety of Goose Creek CISD students, parents and other visitors to district campuses will be required to sign in and obtain visitors' badges at the schools' main offices.

GCCISD uses the RaptorWare® visitor tracking system V-Soft®, which incorporates a search of sex offender data bases. Visitors, volunteers and contractors will be asked to present a valid state-issued ID.

Student/Parent Handbooks

In an effort to be more environmentally friendly and to save money, Goose Creek CISD will continue to put the Student/Parent Handbook online. Instead of handing out handbooks to students on the first day of class, we will provide access to our Student/ Parent Handbook on our website in both English and Spanish. Printed copies of the handbook will still be available at the request of the parent.

Also, all campuses have a computer for parents to access the online Student/Parent Handbook. All forms will be online. The online handbook will offer a faster way to have access to the resource that provides basic information needed during the school year.

Services for Disabled Children Offered

Goose Creek CISD is mandated under federal law to locate, evaluate, identify and provide services to all children who are between the ages of birth and 21 and may have a disability. A full continuum of services is offered for eligible students who reside within the district boundaries or attend a school that is located within the GCCISD boundaries. Upon his or her third birthday, a child identified with a disability (as defined by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act) may begin receiving special education services based on educational need and as specified in an Individual Education Program. These may include such services as speech therapy or placement into a Preschool Program for Children with Disabilities (PPCD).

The PPCD program is a special education program that is designed to promote language development and communication skills, improve gross and fine motor skills and develop socially appropriate behavior. PPCD is available to children with disabilities who are ages 3 through 5. Children who are hearing or visually impaired may begin receiving services through the public schools from birth. The GCCISD Special Education Department will continue to provide parent support through various educational programs and classes.

GIANT THINGS ARE HAPPENING AT GCCISD!

A Culture of Caring

Goose Creek CISD prohibits bullying, including cyberbullying, as defined by state law. If students have a concern, we encourage them to talk to a trusted adult. The website for each school features a "Report Bullying" tab that links to a form for students to complete, urging them to "Take a Stand and Lend a Hand." Anonymous tips are accepted.

The Baytown Campus Crime Stoppers program is a unique program to get students involved in keeping their schools safe. It is a joint effort among Goose Creek CISD Baytown Crime Stoppers, local law enforcement and the community to keep the threat of violence, illegal drugs, weapons and other dangerous activities off school campuses.

The Friends For Life branch allows students to report bullying, suicidal thoughts and other incidents. An anonymous tip can be reported by downloading the P3 Campus app, going to www.P3campus.com or calling 281-427-TIPS (8477). Students may also access Crime Stoppers at www.gccisd.net.

This year, an adult committee is being formed to ensure that the needs of all students are being met. Another measure GCCISD is implementing in continuing to develop a culture of caring is the use of monthly character traits on all campuses. These character traits include Kindness (September), Courage (October), Self-Control (November), Forgiveness (December), Respect (January), Diligence (February), Loyalty (March), Honesty (April) and Confidence (May). We encourage parents to talk to their children about how to show these character traits at home as well as at school.

Engaging Parents in Education Series

Families are often the first to know when something is going wrong in the life of a child or adult with a mental condition. Yet, identifying mental illness and getting good help can be far from easy because stigma and misunderstanding about mental illness prevent families from facing the problem and seeking help.

Goose Creek CISD's Counseling and Student Wellness Division of Behavior and Mental Health Support Systems and the National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) are offering an Engaging Parents in Education Series. This is an ongoing series of free classes for parents and other family caregivers of children and adolescents who have either been diagnosed with a mental health condition or who are experiencing symptoms but have not yet been diagnosed.

We invite you to join other parents as we discuss strategies, diagnoses, treatment, recovery, communication strategies, crisis preparation and available community resources. All sessions are from 9-10 a.m. at the Goose Creek CISD Administration Building. Sessions are Mental Health 101, August 22; What Parents and Professionals Need to Know About Mental Health, October 17; The Diagnosis, December 19; Supports and Services, February 13; Student Portfolio, April 9 and Where to Find Help: Resources for Families, May 14. Dual Credit, Advanced Placement and OnRamps Opportunities

Goose Creek CISD students have the opportunity to earn college credit through the Advanced Placement (AP) Program, Dual Credit courses and OnRamps courses.

More than 20 AP courses and exams are offered across multiple subject areas. Receiving AP credit allows students to get a head start on college-level work, improve their writing skills and develop study habits necessary for tackling rigorous coursework. Students will stand out in the college admissions process as showing commitment to academic excellence. To enroll, students should talk to an AP teacher or academic dean about the courses and finalize their selection by meeting with their grade level counselor.

Dual Credit courses through our partnership with Lee College allow students to enroll in college courses to receive simultaneous academic credit from the college and the high school. Eligible students are able to enroll into approved college courses, and upon completion, receive both college credit and fulfill high school graduation requirements. Students get a head start on their college education while taking courses at a fraction of the cost of most college and universities. Students pay a nonrefundable \$50 fee, and the district pays for tuition, other fees and books no matter how many courses are taken.

OnRamps is an innovative program coordinated by The University of Texas at Austin. First implemented in GCCISD in 2015, OnRamps is designed to help students be more successful in college by introducing them to a rigorous, high-quality college-level course taught in partnership with a UT professor and a high school teacher. A student enrolls in a course taught by a high school teacher for high school credit, but the teacher would use the OnRamps course materials developed by UT Austin. Successfully completing the course per UT standards gives students the opportunity to be awarded college credit from UT as well as high school credit. Students pay a nonrefundable \$50 fee, and the district funds the tuition no matter how many courses the students take. For more information, please visit www.onramps.org.

Steps To Take In Addressing GCCISD Concerns

Individuals who encounter problems or want to voice concerns about GCCISD are encouraged to talk with the appropriate person at the level closest to the situation. For example, if a student has a problem with a bus driver, teacher or school staff member, parents are urged to first discuss the situation with that individual. If the problem is not resolved or if the concern is not addressed at that level, parents are advised to discuss the issue with individuals at the following levels until the situation has been handled properly:

STEP 1

Contact the school staff member involved. Because 95 percent of all problems can be resolved at this level, parents and students are encouraged to discuss the issue with the staff member at the level closest to the situation of concern. This is the most important step in the process.

STEP 2

Contact the principal or program supervisor. If the initial discussion with the staff member involved does not result in a solution to the problem, individuals should contact the administrator who is in charge of the campus or program. This individual is responsible for handling concerns regarding the school or service operation.

STEP 3

Contact the appropriate central office supervisor. Should the problem continue to be unresolved, parents and students should discuss the issue with the appropriate central office supervisor. General district concernssuch as those related to curriculum, discipline. taxes, or business-may also be addressed at this level.

The names of these individuals, their titles, and phone numbers appear on the phone list on Page 14 of this newsletter. If you are unsure about whom to contact, call the GCCISD Administration Building at 281-420-4800.

Step 4 Contact the superintendent. Situations that continue to be unresolved after discussing the issue with the staff member, principal or program supervisor, and the appropriate central office supervisor should be brought to the attention of the superintendent. He will make every effort to resolve the situation at this level.

STEP 5

Contact the School Board. If the concern has not been resolved at any of the previous steps, parents and students may have the issue considered by the Board of Trustees by making a written request to the superintendent. Depending upon the nature of the concern, appeals of a Board decision are made either to the Texas Education Agency or to a district court of law.

Concerns may be placed on the formal Board agenda by notifying the superintendent and the president of the Board no later than noon on the day the agenda and notice are prepared. This is normally at least five days, or three business days, before the regular meeting. Board members will normally allow staff members time to investigate the issue before taking action on such issue at a Board meeting. At regular meetings, the Board allots 30 minutes to hear persons who desire to make comments to the Board. Persons who wish to participate in this portion of the meeting shall sign up with the presiding officer or designee before the meeting begins and shall indicate the topic about which they wish to speak. No presentation shall exceed three minutes. Delegations of more than five persons shall appoint one person to present their views before the Board. By state law, the Board is prohibited from taking action on any matter that is not on the agenda. For information on procedures, call the Superintendent's Office at 281-420-4800.

VOLUNTEERING

School Volunteers Required to Participate in a Background Check

With the safety of all students a top priority, Goose Creek CISD requires all school volunteers to consent to criminal history checks annually.

This procedure, which is also completed with all new employees, helps to ensure that the schools are safe environments for learning.

Information about the criminal history search and a consent form will be sent home with students during the first week of school for all parents who are interested in volunteering. The criminal history forms must be completed online at the district's website <u>www.gccisd.net</u>. Each school site has a computer available to parents and citizens for completing the online criminal history form.

Night Classes Offered at the Peter E. Hyland Center

The district's Night School classes will continue to be offered through the Peter E. Hyland Center located at 1906 Decker Drive. Night School offers courses for credit recovery and original credit. APEX, Odyssey Lab and district-developed lessons will be implemented as tools for student self-paced advancement.

Students who enroll in the Peter E. Hyland Center will have the flexibility to take classes in Night School as part of their daily schedule. All district high school students are eligible to access the program through application and counselor approval. Students enrolled in campuses other than the Peter E. Hyland Center will pay a book fee of \$25 per half credit if applicable. Night School classes are held each Tuesday and Thursday from 3:30 to 8 p.m.

There is a computer at each campus reserved for parents to use during school hours. Campus computers can be used for accessing the district and campus websites or for other school purposes only.

STOPPING FOR SCHOOL BUSES

The policies and laws regarding stopping for a school bus can often be confusing. At Goose Creek CISD, we want to make sure our children are safe at all times, while at the same time making sure drivers are aware of what they should and should not be doing regarding stopping for a school bus.

In Texas, the law states that a driver must stop for flashing red lights on a school bus, regardless of which direction you are headed. Once the bus has moved, the flashing lights stop flashing or the bus driver signals it is okay to pass, you may proceed. Violations can lead



to a \$1,000 fine. The only exception is when there is a physical median present, it is then not required by law to stop for the school bus on the opposite side of the road. However, left turn lanes do not count as medians. For example, in Baytown a driver would have to stop for a student being dropped off on either side of Garth Road because there is no physical median present to separate the traffic.

School buses are a safe mode of transportation. The majority of injuries are caused because motorists do not use caution. Some safety tips for motorists include: obey the posted speed limit, keep an eye on children gathered at bus stops and watch for children who might dart across the street to catch the bus. Also, be aware that fines double in school zones. Drivers are held accountable and responsible to follow the law and use caution to avoid hitting children crossing the street or boarding and unloading school buses.

District Provides Transportation

Transportation is provided for Goose Creek CISD students who live two or more miles from the school they attend or for students who would encounter hazardous conditions on the way to school, as defined by the Texas Education Agency and district guidelines.

Goose Creek CISD bus drivers are only permitted to stop at designated stops. Bus routes are created to enhance student safety while maximizing vehicle efficiency. When possible, stops are created that allow students to wait off the main roadway for the bus. Stops are also created to minimize students walking on highly traveled roadways for long distances without sidewalks. Stops are generally not placed on dead-end streets to minimize bus accidents while backing up the bus. Stops are spread as far apart as criteria will allow to decrease the number of stops each bus will make on its route, thus minimizing the overall riding time for the students.

Busing information for eligible riders will be mailed to students' homes the week of August 5 through August 9. Parents who do not receive this information by August 12 should contact their child's school for details.

Shannon Carter is returning to Baytown as campus athletic director/head football coach at Goose Creek Memorial High School. He began his high school coaching career in Oklahoma at El Reno High School, moving to Norman High School before coming to Texas in 2010 to accept a coaching/teaching assignment at Ross S. 2019 FOOTBALL SEASON TICKET INFORMATION

Season tickets for this year's Ross S. Sterling, Robert E. Lee, and Goose Creek Memorial home football games will go on sale Thursday, August 1st, through Monday, August 19th, at the GCCISD Athletic Office and online through TicketRoar. The Athletic Office is located in the GCCISD Service Center Building, 2200 Market Street, just down the road from Robert E. Lee High School.

The 2018 season ticket owners have until August 19th to renew their ticket order for the 2019 football season. Season tickets that are not renewed by the August 19th deadline can be released for sale to the general public.

The cost of season ticket booklets will vary by school according to the number of games played at Stallworth Stadium. Buying season tickets creates a cost savings of at least \$10 per season or \$2 per game from stadium sales. The 2019 booklet prices are as follows:

• Ross S. Sterling - \$25 per booklet (5 games)

- Robert E. Lee \$25 per booklet (5 games) and \$5 21-6A, and \$3 for Student General
 Goose Creek Memorial \$30 per booklet <u>Admission (grades kindergarten through</u>)

The four games included in the Sterling High School season ticket booklet will be against Clear Creek, Beaumont United, LaPorte, Deer Park and C. E. King. Home games included in the Robert E. Lee booklet will be against Splendora, Galena Park, Santa Fe, Nederland & Crosby. Goose Creek Memorial home games are against Sam Rayburn, South Houston, Clear Falls, HISD Austin, HISD Wisdom and New Caney. Individual game tickets for all three high schools will be available each week throughout the season. Individual game tickets are sold only for the games being played that week. Ticket outlets for individual home game tickets include the three GCCISD high schools and the GCCISD Athletic Office. Individual game tickets for games at Stallworth Stadium that are purchased during the week of the game will cost \$5 for Adult General Admission 9-5A, 12-5A

and \$5 21-6A, and \$3 for Student General Admission (grades kindergarten through 12) for the three UIL Districts. All tickets sold at Stallworth Stadium will be \$7.

The senior citizen Gold Card may be used for complimentary general admission at any regular season home athletic event in GCCISD. Gold Cards are available at the Service Center, 2200 Market Street, to any GCCISD resident age 65 and over.

Thursday and Friday games at Stallworth Stadium will begin at 7 p.m. for 9-5A and 21-6A. Start times for 12-5A are 7:30 p.m. Non-district contests are set by the host teams, and fans should note kickoff times for these games may differ from Baytown start times. Dates and times are subject to change; check the GCCISD website for updated schedules.

Nutrition Is An Essential Ingredient For Learning

"It is no secret that students are better equipped to learn when they have eaten a well-balanced meal," said Natalie Edwards, Food

Services Director for the Goose Creek CISD Nutrition Services Department. "We take our role in the education process very seriously by striving to prepare and serve high quality, nutritious meals to our students each and every day."

Edwards and the rest of the department must stay on top of the nutritional requirements provided by

the Texas Department of Agriculture (TDA) and the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA). All Goose Creek menus undergo strict scrutiny to ensure that the food choices made available to students meet all guidelines for providing students with the fuel they need to succeed.

"Parents can lend their support by encouraging their children to partake of the healthy food options presented each day," added Edwards. She and the staff also invite parents to visit the cafeterias and enjoy these meals first hand.

FREE BREAKFAST FOR ALL STUDENTS

All Goose Creek students are welcome to eat a free breakfast at their school, regardless of whether they qualify for free and reduced-price meals.

Each year, School Food Authorities (such as Nutrition Services at Goose Creek CISD) must review their paid lunch revenue to ensure compliance with the paid lunch equity requirements of the United States Department of Agriculture.

To remain compliant with TDA regulations, some meal prices at GCCISD will be increase slightly this year to the following prices:

ALLERGY CONCERNS

Kirsten Kruizenga, our Registered Dietitian, works with parents and school health professionals to ensure that students with allergies, disabilities or dietary restrictions make the right choices.

Our point of purchase system allows us to flag student accounts to alert cashiers if, for instance, a student is lactose intolerant or has a serious allergy. We can then make sure the student's meal choice will keep them healthy. If you have concerns, ask your physician to complete a Physician's Request for Special Dietary Accommodations Form so we can include that information in your student's profile.

MENUS

Every year, Nutrition Services offers students and parents the opportunity to voice their menu preferences and concerns through surveys, classroom visits and focus groups. Our staff relies on this feedback when we consider menus changes for the next school year. Menus for all grade levels are posted on the district website prior to the start of the month. Elementary school students also receive printed menus to take home prior to the start of each month.

Additionally, parents and health professionals can find nutritional values for every food item posted online with the menus to aid them in helping students with allergies or dietary concerns make the right choices.

FREE AND REDUCED PRICE MEALS

Free or reduced-price meals are provided to students who qualify for such benefits according to specified family size and income standards.

Students who were eligible for this program at the close of the 2018-19 school year will continue to be eligible for up to 30 days, or until new applications are processed. Families that participated in the program last year must re-apply for the 2019-20 school year. Parents of children enrolled in prekindergarten are required to complete an application prior to the first day of the school year. Students enrolling in Goose Creek CISD for the first time must also complete an application and receive approval prior to receiving benefits.

The Nutrition Services Department has an online application service. Go to the district website and click on the "Menus" tab on the home page. From there, click on the tab that says "Free & Reduced Meal Application." You will need to create an account. You may also need your student's ID number and birth date, TANF/SNAP case number and household income.

DIVERSE OPPORTUNITIES OFFERED Academies Achieve Model Status

oose Creek students have the opportunity to choose from a variety of options when creating their graduation plans. Fortyone programs of study in all five endorsement areas are available to students. Through feedback from business and industry partners to target some of the high-wage, high-demand jobs, Goose Creek CISD developed seven career academies. The GCCISD Career Academies are small learning communities within larger campuses that focus on a career theme, allowing students to attend classes with students with similar interests.

"Students in these academies receive handson, project-based instruction in their area of interest that is focused on the goal of earning certifications and college credit toward their degree or employment immediately following high school graduation," said Renea Dillon, director of Career and Technical Education (CTE).

The Health Science Academy at Ross S. Sterling High School and the Science, Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) Academy at Robert E. Lee High School were recently notified that they achieved Model Status, the highest rating granted from the National Career Academy Coalition, based on the National Standards of Practice for Career Academies. These academies met or exceeded proficiency in all 10 areas of the National Standards of Practice (NSOP), which are endorsed by both the Department of Education and the Department of Labor as a guide to best practice in the implementation of quality career academies.

"I was elated to know that we achieved Model Status and will serve as a tour site for aspiring academies across our nation. I'm very proud of this accomplishment and of the hard

work put in by our director of CTE, the campus coordinators and the teaching staff that began this initiative six years ago," said Dr. Randal

O'Brien, Goose Creek CISD superintendent. Goose Creek Memorial High School's Global Business Academy is eligible for review next year, and the Advanced Automotive Academy, Agriculture Science Career Academy, Culinary Arts Career Academy and Manufacturing and Industrial Maintenance Career Academy at Stuart Career Tech High School (SCTHS) are eligible after the first class graduates in 2021. SCTHS is an application-based early college high school, providing students with the opportunity to earn a college associate degree or certificate as well as industry certifications in partnership with Lee College.

IMPACT Early College High School, also application-based, provides an opportunity for students to earn an associate degree from Lee College or to earn hours toward a college degree as they work to complete their high school diploma. Recently recognized by U.S. News and World Report as one of the 2019 Best High Schools, IMPACT ECHS also was named to the 2018-2019 Educational Results Partnership Honor Roll.

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) is a national program the district offers that provides support to students to encourage college and career readiness and success. With AVID, students are able to prepare for the rigors of college level requirements. Students must complete the application process to be accepted into AVID.

Goose Creek CISD is fortunate to be able to offer these diverse and specialized educational opportunities so that students may pursue their areas of interest and prepare for college and careers.
