


Ms. Alexander has helped me through very hard times in my life even outside of school and practice times, and she is very genuine.

Ms. A was the first ever person to introduce me to dance, and she taught me so much in that one year of dance class. In February 2022, when I later made JV Sapphires, my dad passed away and my life was turned upside down. However, my directors asked if they could attend my father's funeral. My directors showed up to my father's visitation, shared their condolences, and comforted me. Seeing how much Ms. A cared about me, even outside of dance, meant the world to me. Once I made Stars and became a Social Officer, my mom began to struggle to be involved or show up to all of my school events and performances, but Ms. A is always there. She makes sure I never feel sad for not having both of my parents with me for every event. Ms. A goes past her job title, helping students and treating them with love like we're her own kids.

She saw potential in me when I first had her in eighth grade dance class at Gentry, no matter how quiet and shy I was. Additionally, Ms. A treats me and my teammates with respect and maturity. She is one of my only teachers who treats us students like the young adults we are and actually prepares us for the real world. Without the structure of my dance team and officer life, I would lack very useful time management and responsibility skills.









Mrs. Brookreson's influence extended well beyond teaching a curriculum; she cultivated a love for language, learning, and self-discovery in me. She embodies the essence of a true educator who not only imparts knowledge but also inspires her students to find their own voices and think critically about the world around them.

She often began our mornings with current news segments from reputable sources like CBS Mornings, sparking thoughtful discussion on significant events worldwide. This daily routine made me feel connected to the world and instilled in me a habit of staying informed—something I still carry with me. In her classroom, I felt safe forming and expressing my own opinions.

As someone who loves reading, I had always enjoyed books, but Mrs. Brookreson changed how I approached them. She taught me rhetorical analysis techniques that reshaped my understanding of text; suddenly, the words on the page became an invitation to dive deeper into meaning and intention. She opened my eyes to the layers of complexity within language, encouraging me to analyze and interpret what authors were conveying. Reading became more than just a pastime—a journey of discovery. Writing, too, became an act of purpose and persuasion. With each essay, Mrs. Brookreson held high expectations for me and my peers' writing, yet her feedback was always constructive and inspiring, pushing us to do better. I knew that she saw potential in each of her students, and that belief made all the difference.

I can say, without a doubt, that her influence will remain with me for the rest of my academic career and beyond. In every way, Mrs. Brookreson embodies what an outstanding educator should be. She nurtures curiosity, fosters critical thinking, and encourages her students to engage with the world thoughtfully. Thank you for considering her for this honor.









The moment I first met Mr. Bryson replays in my head quite often. I think this is because I was wildly wrong about his personality at first. I was fifteen years old and a sophomore in high school. I walked into his classroom on the second day of sophomore year and the first thing I saw was a grumpy bald man with thick lenses on his face and history posters around the room. However, one day in my second year of learning from him, he stopped me on the way out of class, asked me if I was okay, and told me that he was there for me if I ever needed anything. I told him thank you and walked out, but I did need something. I needed someone to talk to who I felt truly would never judge me.

Mr. Bryson is more than a history teacher. He's a friend, a sign in the morning to have a good day, a really hard laugh when all you want to do is cry. As a person, I would not be myself today, if it were not for Mr. Bryson.









To the teacher that made me fall in love with math, Mrs. Anitria Collette, who was my fourth-grade math teacher at David Crockett Elementary School. Up until this point, I didn't really like math or school until I got her as my teacher.





My name is Cheyanne Barber and the teacher most important to me is Ms. Nichols. She has influenced me in a way no other teacher has.


